Pandemics: Covid-19

A pandemic is the global outbreak of a disease. There are many examples in history, the most recent being the COVID-19 pandemic, declared as such by the World Health Organization on March 12, 2020.

Pandemics are generally classified as epidemics first, which is the rapid spread of a disease across a particular region or regions Coronaviruses are a type of virus. There are many different kinds, and some cause disease.

A newly identified type has caused a recent outbreak of respiratory illness now called COVID-19. Coronaviruses are named for their appearance: Under the microscope, the viruses look like they are covered with pointed structures that surround them like a corona, or crown.

The new coronavirus disease, called COVID-19, has appeared and spread extremely quickly, making its way to over 100 countries since its December 2019 discovery in China. This particular type of respiratory disease is caused by a virus called SARS-CoV-2. It's part of a larger family of coronaviruses, the majority of which cause only the common cold.

EPIDEMIC

An epidemic is the occurrence in a community or region, of cases of an illness, specific health-related behaviour, or other health-related events, clearly in excess of normal expectancy. The community or region and the period in which the cases occur are specified precisely.

PANDEMIC


A pandemic is the worldwide spread of a new disease. The declaration of a pandemic is a reference to its spread, rather than its severity. With 118,000 cases of Covid-19 having been detected across 110 countries, the WHO on March 11 declared it to be a pandemic.

Notable Pandemics in History

In addition to HIV, which has killed over 39 million people since 1982, there have been other equally devastating pandemics in history:

- •The Plague of Justinian of 541 A.D. bubonic plague and wiped out 25-50 million people in one year.
- •The Black plague killed more than 75 million people from 1347 to 1351



- •The Spanish flu pandemic of 1918 killed well over 50 million people in one year.
- •The smallpox pandemic of the 20th century claimed between 300 to 500 million lives.
- •The ongoing tuberculosis pandemic continues to kill over 1.5 million people annually.
