Hampi - Mahanavami/Dasara Dibba



Mahanavami Dibba is a monument in Hampi , the capital city of Vijayanagar empire . Standing atop the Mahanavami Dibba gives you a beautiful view of the entire Royal Enclosure, and quite a bit of Hampi. It certainly must have been the preferred seat of the kings! It was built by King Krishnadevaraya in 1513 AD after his conquest over the kingdom of Udayagiri, present day Orissa.

Mysuru - Dasara Navaratri



Dasara Dibba represents the typical Vijayanagara style of architecture. The stone platform is about 12 m height. The huge structure is a square platform with three layers that are richly decorated with beautiful carvings. The carvings at the lower portion of the Dasara Dibba are the most fascinating. The sides of the platform are also engraved with elaborate carvings of merchants, royal processions, musicians, elephants and animals, foreign traders.

New Delhi - Republic day Parade



The grand platform was used as a stage by the kings to watch the army march-past, the war games and the royal procession that were held during the Mahanavami festival, also known as the Dasara festival.

The most important Navarathri celebration, the nine day- nine night state festival were the annual occasion the governors of various provinces under the king visited the capital to pledge their loyalty to the king's dominion.

For the king it was an event to demonstrate the imperial pomp and power at his disposal. It is also believed that over this platform was built another covered structure, probably built of wood. The platform itself is not a solid block of stone, but has a passage and staircase inside, leading from the first tier to the top! The fact that it stands till today is a miracle! A possible close replication and continuation of this you can still witness during the Dussera season at the Mysore palace, the later day capital of the state. Queensland, Australia



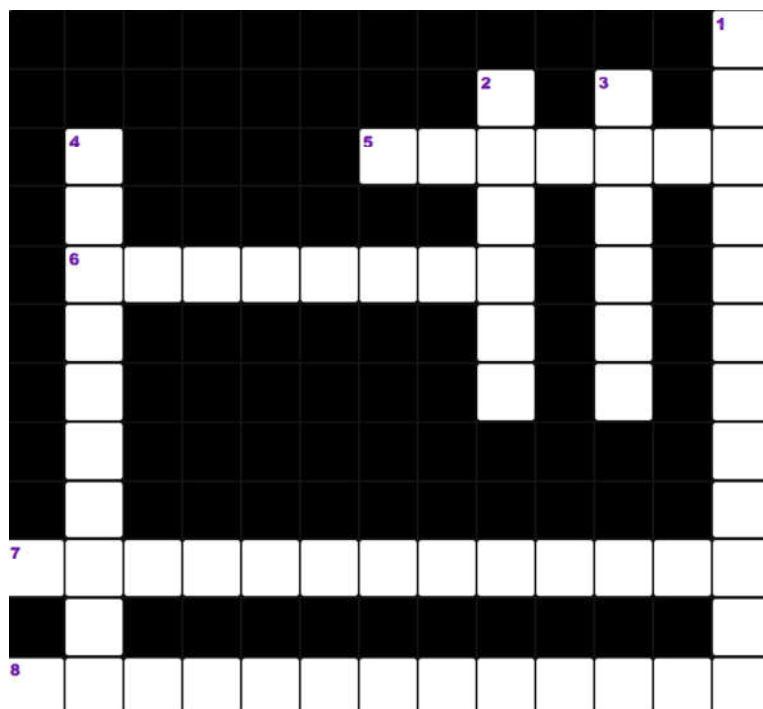
The Great Barrier Reef is nature's greatest gift to Australia. It is a mosaic alive with diversity with over 4,000 coral reefs, cays and islands and is home to thousands of species. The Great Barrier Reef is a living treasure to be cherished, respected and protected, for now and into the future.

Australia's Great Barrier Reef is the largest reef system in the world, and can be seen from outer space. Encompassing a 133,000-square mile area. Although many corals may look like plants, they're actually animals; they are most closely related to jellyfish and anemones. Coral reefs grow very slowly, at an average rate of just two centimeters per year. Coral reefs only grow at a maximum depth of around 150 feet. This is because their biomes must maintain a temperature of 70 to 85° Fahrenheit.

Like a pearl, Coral gemstone too is a magical stone which is a precious gift of the sea. Despite being formed of soft skeletons, the durability of red coral gemstones is remarkable. Coral is an amazing organic gemstone (rather than a mineral one), formed by the skeletons of gelatinous marine animals called polyps. Coral reef plants and animals are important sources of new medicines being developed to treat cancer, arthritis, human bacterial infections, Alzheimer's disease, heart disease, viruses, and other diseases.
